This can reduce inflammation and the cyst may not need to be drained. But infected cysts may need to be cut and drained. To do this, your provider makes a hole in (punctures) the top and removes the contents. Large cysts can come back after this procedure and may have to be surgically removed (excised). They may go unnoticed until an imaging scan — such as an MRI, CT, or ultrasound scan — detects them. If a cyst develops on the brain, it can cause headaches and other symptoms. Some of the most common types of cyst include: Acne cysts Cystic acne, or nodulocystic acne, is a severe type of acne in which the skin's pores become blocked, leading to infection and inflammation. A doctor may recommend surgery or prescription antibiotics as treatment. In females, these cysts can develop or change in size throughout the menstrual cycle, and they often disappear on their own. Sometimes, a health professional may examine the removed liquid under a microscope to determine whether or not any cancerous cells are present. If they suspect that the cyst is cancerous, they may suggest surgical removal, order a biopsy of the cyst wall, or both. Many cysts develop as a result of a chronic or underlying medical condition, as may be the case with fibrocystic ovary syndrome. In such cases, the focus of the treatment will be on the medical condition itself, not the cyst. Cysts are abnormal, fluid-filled sacs that can develop in tissues in any part of the body. They are relatively common, and there are many different types. Infections, tumors, parasites, and injuries can cause cysts. They are usually noncancerous.
